Best in Show (cert 12, 2000)

This is a very funny mockumentary about the fictional goings-on of canines, owners, organisers and groupies at a dog show - complete with a rendition of 'God Loves A Terrier' to the tune of 'God Loves America'. (90 minutes)

Cat On A Hot Tin Roof (cert U, 1958)

Elizabeth Taylor joins Paul Newman and Burl Ives in the classic story of an alcoholic ex-football player drinking his days away...until a reunion with his dying father triggers memories and revelations. (108 minutes)

Kiss Me Kate (cert U, 1953)

Featuring songs by Cole Porter, this is a play within a play as Howard Keel and Kathryn Grayson play two divorced actors brought back together for a musical performance of The Taming Of The Shrew. (109 minutes)

Koyaanisqatsi (cert U, 1986)

A panoramic view of America without commentary using slow-motion and time-lapse photography set to the music of Philip Glass. The film soars across America seeking out natural and man-made vistas. (86 minutes)

The King's Speech (cert 15, 2010)

This Oscar- and BAFTA-winning production hardly needs introducing: it is the private story of that most public of men, King George VI, and his relationship with Australian speech therapist Lionel Logue. (118 minutes)

The Mission (cert 15, 1986)

Adventure and drama as Spanish Jesuits in the 18th century try to protect a remote South American tribe. A cinematic spectacle starring Robert de Niro and Jeremy Irons. (125 minutes)
